Blessed Lent and Welcome to St. Augustine of Canterbury Episcopal Church!

We pray that as you worship here during this Lenten season you will join us in praising God.

The word Lent comes from the old English word "lencten" which means lengthening or "Springtime." Lent is not only a forty-day season that focuses on the story of Jesus' passion and death, but rather, Lent is a *journey of conversion*, a passage of a people who have been forever marked by the story's end—Jesus' passion, death and resurrection. Originally, the forty days of Lent were understood as the final stage of preparation for those called to baptism and also as a time for reconversion for those already baptized. Thus, we undertake the Lenten journey, as did ancient pilgrims before us, in the company of others. We mark the steps of our journey by gathering each week to evangelize and be evangelized, that is, to hear the story of Jesus set next to our life stories.

One will notice the restrained atmosphere during the Lenten season at St. Augustine's as seen in the liturgy and vestments, and even heard in the music. By "scaling back" our normal celebrative Sunday experience we seek to focus our attention during this penitential season of the year on what is essential to our faith and salvation. Indeed, to emphasize prayer during this season we hearken to an ancient tradition observed by our Jewish brothers and sisters, by creating a sackcloth "Wailing Wall" behind the altar where each week we will place our "Prayer Ropes" which are a visible and tangible expression of the prayers and intercessions of the congregation.

I invite you to participate in worship today as you feel comfortable. You will find St. Augustine's to be that place where you will receive a radical WELCOME, experience thought-provoking and inspiring WORSHIP, and meet other disciples of Jesus ready and willing to WITNESS to all that God is doing!

If this is your first time in the Episcopal Church, everything you need to follow worship is in this Worship Guide. If you have <u>any</u> questions please do not hesitate to ask anyone around you for help.

I hope to meet you before or after worship but just in case I do not, please fill out the attendance sheet in your bulletin and place it in the offering plate so we can connect with you.

When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

Remember all who minister in your church, especially Michael our Presiding Bishop, Poulson our Bishop, and all bishops; Joseph and James our Priests, Mary Ann our Deacon, and all who minister in your Church.

Remember all your people, and those who seek your truth.

Remember all those on our church prayer lists in their need, supplication, or thanksgivings.

Remember all who have died in the peace of Christ and those whose faith is known to you alone; bring them into the place of eternal joy and light. And grant that we may find our inheritance with the Blessed Virgin Mary, with patriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, with Saint Augustine of Canterbury and all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. If you wish to receive the bread dipped in wine, please receive a napkin from an usher. The bread will be dipped in the wine for you by the clergy, then placed on the napkin. After consuming the bread, please place the napkin in one of the wicker receptacles.

If you wish to receive bread only or wine from the common cup, do not receive a napkin, but approach the priest with cupped hands.

To drink from the cup, please consume the bread and help the chalice bearer guide the cup to your lips.

Continue down the outside aisle to return to your seat.

Please note that gluten-free bread is available for those who request it. Kindly let the usher know if you need the clergy to bring the bread to you. If you wish to only receive a blessing, cross your arms over your chest.




+ THE LENTEN CROSS +

The Processional Cross used during the Lenten season was created by Bruce Scambler and took some 100 hours to make. The cross has a great deal of symbolism in its design. It is over seven feet tall and incorporates 12 different woods to represent the twelve disciples and the "various ethnicities represented at St. Augustine's."

The woods used in the vertical upright include: 110 year old Redwood from the family barn, Ebony, American Oak, Crepe Myrtle, Pine, Beech, Horse-chestnut, Walnut, Pecan, Cedar and Hickory. On one side of the upright are five carved hearts which represent the wounds of Christ. These "hearts" also represent our commitment to be an inclusive faith organization to those of the LGBTQ communities.

The horizontal crossbeam was made from 25-year-old driftwood excavated from the mud at Lake Texhoma. If one looks closely at the crossbeam, you will notice the abstract design of the "Hands of Christ" in agony. Finally, at the top of the cross is a "secret compartment" where the names of congregation members are placed during the season of Lent.

+ THIS IS OUR STORY +

Page 18 of the Book of Common Prayer states that "The Ember Days, (are) traditionally observed on the Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday after the First Sunday in Lent (today), Holy Cross Day (September 14), December 13 (St. Lucy's Day), and the Day of Pentecost." The name is a corruption of the Latin, quattuor tempora (meaning "four times"). In third century Italy, the times were associated with sowing, harvest, and vintage, for which the faithful prayed, fasted, and gave alms. However, beginning in the twelve century, the days became occasions for the ordination of priests and deacons for whom the Christian community prayed, and the candidates for ordination prepared themselves by prayer and retreat. Our Book of Common Prayer lists prayers "For the Ministry (Ember Days)" on pages 356-357. These prayers are divided into "For those to be ordained", "For the choice of fit persons for the ministry", and "For all Christians in their vocation". Three lectionaries for these days are listed on page 929. In recent times, Roman Catholics and Anglicans have been far less strict in linking "Ember Days" and the ordinations with which they are associated with specific days of the church's year.
