**+ THIS IS OUR STORY +**

Ordination is the process by which individuals are consecrated, that is set apart and elevated from the laity to the clergy and are thus authorized to perform various religious rites and ceremonies. One who is in preparation for ordination is called an ordinand. Consecration is an act by which a person or thing are separated from everyday use and dedicated permanently to the sacred by prayer and ceremonies which can neither be revoked nor repeated. There are three degrees of ordination: deacon, presbyter, and bishop. Both bishops and presbyters are priests and have authority to celebrate the Eucharist. However, in common use, the term “priest” usually refers to presbyters. Apostolic succession is an essential and necessary concept for ordination, with the belief that all ordained clergy are ordained by bishops who were ordained by other bishops tracing back to the bishops ordained by the Apostles who were ordained by Christ, who conferred his priesthood upon his Apostles. Ordination of a bishop is performed by several bishops, while ordination of a priest or deacon is usually performed by a single bishop. Only priests and bishops may bless persons or objects and administer the sacraments of confession, unction (anointing the sick), and Eucharist.
