We are delighted that you have chosen to worship with us during this Advent Season.

During these four weeks before Christmas, the Church stops to prepare for the birth of our Savior Jesus Christ. Advent bridges the past and the future, and brings them into the present. Advent is a time of the Christ who was, who is, and who is to come. Christ is seen not only as a child born of Mary, crucified and resurrected, nor as the fulfillment of all things, but as an active presence here and now. Christ stirs power from the past and hope from the future, to begin his Messianic reign in the present, which begins in the hearts of those who follow the Christ.

Even as we look at our liturgical environment, we see that it echoes what nature herself displays. Indeed, Advent is that inky blue hour between night and day, between the deep purple darkness and the light, when we know in our hearts that indeed "the dawn from on high will break upon us." It is the messenger before the day of God, as John the baptizer was the messenger before Jesus, calling people in darkness to increase in light of love, and bear fruit worthy of repentance.

It is only through our waiting and preparation, listening to the Word proclaimed, and partaking of the Sacraments that we are able to reply with Mary, "Let it be with me according to your word." Only then will the golden dawn of the future for which we yearn begin to break forth in all of its splendor.

+ THIS IS OUR STORY +

Estimates of the value of the gold, frankincense, and myrrh given by the Magi range as high as \$3-4 million dollars. This would be a fortune to the poor Holy Family, but what did they do with their newfound wealth? A simple tradition holds that the proud parents used the gold to pay for the stable, the frankincense to perfume it, and the myrrh as an ointment for the new-born baby. Another tradition suggests that Joseph and Mary used the gifts to finance their flight to Egypt to avoid King Herod's plan to kill Jesus. The event is shrouded with interpretations that have no substantiation in Mathew's gospel, the event's only chronicle. For example, the gospel never mentions the number of Magi; in Eastern Christianity, the Magi number twelve. Their identification as kings is not mentioned by Mathew, but it is linked to Isaiah, who refers to "kings (coming) to the brightness of your dawn" bearing "gold and frankincense". Although most traditional nativity scenes depict three Wise Men accompanied by the shepherds and angels around the manger, this is an artistic convention allowing the chronologically separate visits of the shepherds and the Magi to be combined for convenience.
